A1-Judy Heath, LISW-CP, "What You Don't Know about Grief Can Hurt You and Your Clients" Many people seeking Grief Therapy drop out after a couple of sessions. This Presentation helps Social Workers avoid common pitfalls. Recent research has dispelled widely accepted myths. For example: more is understood about the link of physical manifestations and trauma, to loss. Learn effective ways to help those who grieve.

A2-Adam Hiers, LMSW, "The Home Again Program" The Home Again Program is a South Carolina Medicaid initiative which seeks to transition persons who are living in certain institutions back into the community. Long term care supports and services in South Carolina have an institutional bias that restricts personal choice and freedom. The Home Again program is seeking to rebalance the state's long term care investment by shifting services and resources from an institutional focus to one that is community based.

A3-Carl Maas, PhD, MPHA, LMSW, Suk Yin Lee, BA, and Lindsay Hilger, BSW, "Understanding Predictors and Associations to Intimate Partner Violence Exposure" Attendees will learn about developmental predictors associated with intimate partner violence (IPV) in self-identified groups of abused and non-abused children. Demographic associations between adjudicated men and women in a local batterer intervention program will be examined using the Propensity to Abuse Scale. IPV prevention and treatment will be discussed.

A4-Maxie Perry-Smith, EdD, LBSW, C-SWCM, "Technology and the Human Services Worker" This workshop is an assessment of the use of the technology utilized in the field of Human Services. This workshop analyzes the impact technology has on the way in which services are delivered within human services entities. The way in which technology is utilized will determine how well our clients and communities are served.

A5-Patricia Ryan, LISW-CP, "Applications of Jung's Psychological Type in Counseling & Psychotherapy" This will be an application workshop utilizing examples, case studies, and interactive exercises. The purpose will be to identify personality factors in both intrapersonal and interpersonal issues and problems. Prerequisites: entry level understanding of the 8 preferences (E,I,S,N,T,F,J,P) and the 8 brain functions (Se,Si,Ne,Ni,Te,Ti,Fe,Fi).

Catherine Hallett, LISW-CP, DCSW, “Combat Operational Stress Control: Social Workers in a Deployed Environment” In an effort to prevent Post Traumatic Stress and other mental health problems, social workers are part of mental health teams embedded with military personnel at forward operating bases providing onsite prevention and outreach services.

C-2 Donna Happach, LMSW, PhD Candidate, “Sometimes I Feel like a NUT!” (evidence-based practice) Social work is emphasizing evidence-based practice (EBP). Funders are driving the use of specific models resulting in desired outcomes based on research. Understanding what EBP is and incorporating it into practice presents opportunities and challenges to increase practice knowledge and skills

C-3 Robert Hock, PhD, LISW-CP, and Rachel Moore, BA, MSW Candidate, “Family Interventions for Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASD)” Families of children with ASD face unique challenges that create intense stressors and relationship demands for parents and siblings. The presenters will review the latest ASD research related to family outcomes. In addition, they will use didactic and experiential approaches to highlight concrete interventions to use with siblings and parents.

C-4 Jerry Robinson, LMSW, and Betty Ann Surratt, LISW-CP, “Alzheimer's Disease: The Power of Validation Therapy “ An overview that emphasizes statistics of the increase in those suffering from Alzheimer’s Disease and the need for services. Erikson’s model of life tasks (needing to be completed at different stages in life) will be related to how incomplete tasks reemerge later. Principles of validation will be identified, as well as techniques of validation, in working with individuals with Alzheimer’s Disease.

This presentation will introduce the basics of military culture, those affected by it and social workers particular ability to aid these groups

D2-Barbara JW Austin, LISW-CP – Part 1, “Don't Tell Me How to Raise My Child: A Parenting Model” In order to respect “the client’s right to self- determination”, while helping mandated clients keep their children, we need to find a way to circumvent resistance and help them WANT to change “dearly held”, habituated behaviors. Learn about the Triple P-Positive Parenting Program, and how it’s unique design honors the parent’s decisions while promoting change.

F1- Dr. Gwendolyn Prater, MSW, PhD, NASW Assurance- Part 1, Ethical Practice: A Social Worker’s Best Defense Against Malpractice. Presented by NASW national office, this workshop will explore ways the practitioner can protect him/herself from malpractice risk.

J1-Timothy P. Cross, MSW, PhD Candidate, "Considering Smart Technology's Effect on Marginalized Communities" The internet is widely hailed as a "democratizing force." This workshop will focus on a conceptual framework that considers the ways in which 21st century internet technologies restrict the voice of the poor, and relate this framework to other marginalized groups that social workers commonly work with.

J2-Aidyn Ianchini, PhD, and Antwan Aiken "The Complexities of Interdisciplinary Collaboration in School Social Work Practice" Social workers practicing in schools are increasingly being asked to work within collaborative, interdisciplinary teams. While essential to the delivery and coordination of services, these teams oftentimes are complex to navigate in practice.
